



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
**Going-concern risk-based capital requirements (own funds requirements)**




**Gone-concern risk-based capital requirements (TLAC/MREL in TREA)**



**Gone-concern leverage based capital requirements (TLAC/MREL in TEM)**




**Going-concern leverage based capital requirements (leverage ratio)**

# Loss scenario – G-SII with RWA density 25%




# Loss scenario – GSII with RWA density 40%

# Loss scenario – GSII with RWA density 40%

(shortage of Eligible Liabilities)



Portion of CET1 used to meet CBR, as no double counting of capital used to meet CBR to meet MREL requirement is allowed (Article 128 CRD5) This capital is first allocated to MREL, as that is more binding requirement with stricter consequences when breached.

Shortage of Eligible Liabilities increases the part of the MREL requirement that needs to be covered with own funds
